Committee on Order of Business Report

The 2020 Committee on Order of Business met after the 2019 Annual Meeting in Marion to evaluate the 2019 Annual Meeting. They met on March 26 and September 24 to make decisions regarding abbreviated 2020 meeting plans, the 2023 meeting location, and to confirm and update information to report for the 2021 and 2022 meetings.

The Committee recommends that:

1. Jeremy Byrd of Lincoln Avenue Baptist Church, Jacksonville bring the 2021 annual sermon, and that Denver Ayres of Logan Street Baptist Church, Mt. Vernon be the alternate speaker.

2. The 2023 IBSA annual meeting be held at Cornerstone Church in Marion November 8-9.

Due to the Coronavirus pandemic, the IBSA Board of Directors found it necessary to meet on July 14 and relocate the 2020 IBSA Annual Meeting from the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Springfield on November 4-5 to Tabernacle Baptist Church in Decatur, on November 4 only. In order to fulfill contractual agreements with the Crowne Plaza, the IBSA Board also voted to relocate the November 10-11, 2021 meeting from Broadview Missionary Baptist Church in Broadview to the Crowne Plaza in Springfield. The Committee on Order of Business affirmed these actions at its September 24 meeting, and also reaffirmed that the 2022 IBSA annual meeting will be held at Metro Community Church in Edwards-ville.

Constitution Committee Report

The IBSA Constitution Committee met on March 26 to review and consider the IBSA Constitution, Bylaws for both the Baptist Children's Home and Family Services (BCHFS) and the Baptist Foundation of Illinois (BFI), and the Association's Officer and Committee Manual as directed in Article VIII, Section 8 of the IBSA Constitution.

During its August 25 meeting the Committee discussed one item in the IBSA Constitution that includes provisions for continuing IBSA business if an emergency prevents the IBSA Annual Meeting from occurring.

Following are the committee's recommended changes to the IBSA Constitution for first reading at the 2020 IBSA Annual Meeting, and for discussion and action at the 2021 IBSA Annual Meeting. Also included are the recommended second reading changes to the IBSA Constitution and the BCHFS and BFI Bylaws, to be voted on by the association messengers at the 2020 IBSA Annual Meeting.

RECOMMENDED AMENDMENTS FOR FIRST READING

<u>Recommended Changes (noted in red type) to the IBSA Constitution – First</u> <u>Reading</u>

ARTICLE V

MEETINGS

Section 1. IBSA shall meet in annual session at such time and place as it may determine.

Section 2. Special meetings of the IBSA may be called:

1. Upon the request of five (5) messengers at the Annual Meeting of IBSA in writing to the president of the IBSA or by two officers of the IBSA in writing to the chairman of the Board of Directors of IBSA.

2. Approval of a Special Meeting shall require a two-thirds affirmative vote of those present and voting either by the messengers at the IBSA Annual Meeting or by the IBSA Board of Directors.

Section 3. The time and/or place of the annual or special meetings of IBSA may be changed upon approval of two-thirds of the Board of Directors.

Section 4. If emergency circumstances prohibit an in-person IBSA Annual Meeting, the IBSA Board of Directors shall be authorized to conduct the essential operational business of IBSA and its entities, excluding Constitutional and Bylaw changes, until the time of the next Annual Meeting.

Section 54. In case of the absence of the vice president from the annual or special meetings of IBSA, the president shall appoint an assistant, subject to the approval of the messengers, to serve when IBSA is in session.

Section 65. In case of the absence of the president from the annual or special meetings of IBSA, the vice president shall assume the duties of the president, retaining the position of vice president. The vice president may appoint an

assistant, subject to the approval of the messengers, to serve when IBSA is in session.

Section 76. Motions made by messengers dealing with internal operations or ministries of an entity shall be referred to the elected board of the entity for consideration and a report to the constituency and to the next Annual Meeting of IBSA. On all matters referred by the messengers of the IBSA shall respond in writing at the close of their report in the Book of Reports and the IBSA Annual, giving specific information on:

1. How the matter referred was considered,

2. How it was reported to the constituency; and,

3. Any actions on the matter taken by the entity or action proposed to the Annual Meeting. (approved 11-2-16)

Section 3.4c

the membership of the board consisting of a minimum of one-third (1/3) laypersons. (A lay person shall be defined as anyone who is not vocationally employed in a ministry position by a church <u>or</u> association. or state convention. A lay person who begins ministry employment with a church <u>or</u> association or state convention shall be eligible to continue service until the expiration of his/her term),

ARTICLE VII

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 14.

The board shall be organized into standing committees. Each committee shall have a chairpersonman, a vice-chairpersonman, and a secretary. At the last committee meeting of the year, officers are elected for the following year. The chairpersonman of the board shall appoint each board member to one standing committee each year. The standing committees shall evaluate, approve, and recommend to the board such goals as may pertain to that committee's area of responsibility.

ARTICLE VIII STANDING COMMITTEES

Section 2

The standing committees of IBSA shall consist of twelve (12) members each. One-third (1/3) of the members shall rotate off annually. Any person having served three (3) years, or major fraction thereof, shall be ineligible for re-election to the same committee until at least one (1) year has elapsed. Committee membership shall be reserved for those who have been a member in residence of cooperating IBSA member churches for at least twelve (12) months immediately prior to election, and who continue such membership during their term.

(Delete the following because it will be covered in the changes made in ARTICLE III,7) 5. **Conflict of Interest.** No member of the immediate family of the Executive Director or the Director of Accounting may serve on the Board.

Historical Committee Report

The Historical Committee met on March 17, 2020, at the IBSA Building, with most members attending via teleconference. Assigned tasks and responsibilities were reviewed.

Susan Full reported on the priorities and efforts of the Archive Ad Hoc Work Group. The work group is tasked with receiving, organizing, and preserving materials about Illinois Baptists, their churches and associations, and the Illinois Baptist State Association.



IBSA Executive Director Nate Adams reviewed the status of the timeline project. A lengthy list of important dates and events in IBSA history has been compiled. To facilitate progress on the timeline, two subcommittees were established, and several committee members volunteered for that work. The Research and Writing subcommittee, chaired by Keith Baker, will more fully develop the descriptions of events. Susan Full chairs the Archives subcommittee, which will identify photographs, documents, and objects to add visual interest to the timeline, which will be placed in the Welcome Center of the IBSA Building.

In recent years there have been inquiries about various monuments and markers related to Illinois Baptist

history. To aid in monitoring their physical condition and to answer inquiries more easily, the committee is compiling a list and set of photographs of such monuments.

The Committee will meet to discuss any newly submitted resolutions, and either prepare those resolutions for presentation and vote at the afternoon session or recommend that they be referred to the 2021 Resolutions and Christian Life Committee for further work and consideration.



On the BCHFS GraceHaven Pregnancy Resource Clinic

WHEREAS the Baptist Children's Home and Family Services of Illinois (BCHFS) has offered God-honoring ministry since 1918, and

WHEREAS BCHFS places high priority on the biblical understanding of the image of God in humanity and therefore seeks to offer needed services to promote life and well-being for mothers, children, and the unborn, and

WHEREAS under the exemplary leadership of executive director Denny Hydrick, BCHFS is expanding its services with a new pregnancy resource clinic in Mt. Vernon, Illinois, called "GraceHaven," providing care for expectant

mothers and their unborn children, including pregnancy tests, ultrasound imaging, testing for sexually transmitted diseases, mentoring for expectant mothers and fathers, and resources to empower individuals during a complicated season of life, and

WHEREAS Scripture teaches believers are not to "withhold good from those to whom it is due, when it is in your power to do it." es for their prayerful support and for the promotion of its services through IBSA churches to families and especially young women in need of biblical, godly guidance in time of such critical life decisions.

On Parental Rights Bill HB4870

WHEREAS Illinois General Assembly House Bill 4870 (HB4870) mandates the Human Papillomavirus (HPV) Vaccine for all sixth-grade students in public, private, parochial, and home schools, with completion of the HPV vaccines by ninth grade, and

WHEREAS HPV is a sexually transmitted infection, but not a highly contagious childhood disease such as measles, and inoculations against it may be given up to age 26, and

WHEREAS government intervention through HB4870 may result in an increase of sexual activity in adolescents, threaten parents with action by the state's Child Protective Services if they choose against having their children inoculated for HPV, and ignore the rights of parents to make decisions for their children based on religious freedom and appropriate exemptions, now therefore, be it

RESOLVED that the elected messengers of the Illinois Baptist State Association, in Annual Meeting on November 4, 2020, do respectfully urge legislators of the State of Illinois to refuse this amendment to the Communicable Disease Prevention Act, adhering instead to the preservation of the rights of parents to make decisions for their minor children in keeping with their personal religious standards, and with their Constitutional rights of equal justice and due process, and be it further

Chairman of the Board of Directors' Report Bob Dickerson



2020 got off to a great start as our association had spent 2019 in the "Refocus" process and was prepared to assist individual churches and associations in using a similar "Refocusing" strategy to assist in developing spiritually healthy habits. Then Covid-19 happened. The ministry of IBSA had to "Refocus" even more significantly in ways that we at first thought to be temporary, but we have seen the effects linger beyond anything we could have imagined at the start.

In the spring we had our first virtual board meeting, all of our committees had virtual meetings, we had several virtual advisory meetings, and in September, we had our second virtual board meeting. I do want to thank the staff and board members for their cooperation and ability to learn new ways to fulfill the work the board has been called to do. Many thanks to our Executive Director who has gone above and beyond the call of duty to keep

the staff safe, but at the same time has created webinars and virtual meetings that has allowed the staff to keep in touch with the churches during a time when in person meetings were limited. As it was in all of our churches, we have persevered together through this season of challenge. Although we have had to be creative, our Executive Director has led the staff to keep in touch and assist churches safely and effectively throughout the pandemic.

The 2021 goals to engage our God-given Mission and Vision can be summarized by this statement. "Praying for God's guidance and power, and cooperating with associations and other partners, we will strive to truly assist churches as we develop leaders, inspire cooperation, stimulate church health and evangelistic growth, and catalyze evangelistic church planting and missions."

For those who are prayerfully led by God to utilize the training and resources that will be made available, Church Revitalization will be a focus in 2021. The IBSA Board has agreed with our Executive Director that Revitalization should be a priority ministry for those churches who choose to take advantage of opportunities that will be made available to assist them in refocusing their ministries to more effectively fulfill the Great Commission in their context.

For months, our churches have had to try new things to be relevant to the needs of their members. Now more than ever, it would be advantageous for individual churches to make contact with IBSA to utilize the help available to "Refocus" and "Revitalize" our ministries to achieve in Christ maximum effectiveness in this new era we will be living in.

It has been my privilege and pleasure to serve as Chair of the Illinois Baptist State Association for the past two years. As of this annual meeting, I will rotate out of this position with the utmost confidence in our Executive Director and staff to assist Illinois churches and associations to do their work for the Kingdom. The flexibility and creativity of our staff is to be commended as they have utilized this time to further train in areas with outside consultants that will make the ministry even more effective in the years to come.

Please pray for our Executive Director, staff, and board members as they continue the work of the association. As long as there are those without Christ is our state, we have a mission to accomplish. If we agree with God and each other, He can do it through us. So many are discouraged about the future and fear continues to seek an inroad to overwhelm our hope for the future. However, draw some encouragement from every mighty oak tree you see standing tall in the wind. That magnificent creation of God is just some little nut that held its ground. If enough little nuts hold our ground in God's firm foundation, a mighty forest of fruitfulness will abound as God accomplishes through us His purposes in the ministries of the Illinois Baptist State Association.

Executive Director' Report Dr. Nate Adams



For 2020, the IBSA Board of Directors approved four major goals, along with multiple metrics for each goal:

Praying for God's guidance and power, and cooperating with associations and other partners, we will strive to truly assist churches as we:

1. Develop Leaders: Effectively engage a growing network of church pastors, staff, planters and other leaders in spiritual, relational development processes, striving for breakthrough growth in leaders that helps transform churches into higher levels of effectiveness.

2. Inspire Cooperation: Effectively communicate and consult with IBSA churches and leaders, continually developing excellent relationships and trustworthy services and processes that strengthen Baptist identity, affinity, and cooperation.

3. Stimulate Church Health and Evangelistic Growth: Effectively train and resource churches in the making, maturing, and multiplication of both disciples and leaders, and in the development of new and improved ministries.

4. Catalyze Evangelistic Church Planting and Missions: Effectively facilitate the movement of evangelistic volunteers from churches to their Acts 1:8 mission fields, and the multiplication of evangelistic, cooperating Baptist churches and pastors throughout Illinois.

The IBSA staff has been pursuing each of these goals and corresponding metrics, many of which cannot be fully reported until after year-end 2020 Annual Church Profile data is available from churches in January 2021. The Coronavirus pandemic that has immersed the country and indeed the world throughout most of 2020 has had several negative impacts on these goals and metrics, but some positive.

By the end of 2020, 14 new church plants are anticipated (up from 11 in 2019), and about 70 church plants are in some stage of development. In addition, 10 new churches are being recommended for affiliation at the 2020 IBSA Annual Meeting. Baptisms in IBSA churches were down 3.3% in 2019, after being up 6.8% in 2018. Pat Pajak retired as IBSA's Evangelism Director at the end of 2019, and his replacement is still being sought.

IBSA's two camps properties have had a forced sabbatical for most of 2020, due to state-mandated Coronavirus restrictions and safety precautions. Only small groups of volunteers have been able to socially-distance at the camps, but this has enabled IBSA's two new camp managers (Brock Vandever at Lake Sallateeska and Jacob Kimbrough at Streator) to have a more gradual orientation to their new roles. IBSA appreciates the many faithful years of service by camp managers Philip Hall and Mike Young, both of whom moved on to new ministry opportunities in 2020. At a time when many denominations and Baptist state conventions are selling camp properties, IBSA is pleased to have been able to "double down" its commitment to its camp ministries, both of which were experiencing growth prior to the Coronavirus. We look forward to a great "rebound" in 2021.

In spite of this year's Coronavirus restrictions, IBSA will reach its goal of having more than 500 pastors and leaders involved in leadership development events and groups. This has been possible

because of an early pivot to online delivery that has resulted in 558 pastors or leaders participating in webinars through August, and more than 200 participating in extended online courses or cohorts. In addition to these leadership development efforts, 3599 individuals from 568 churches have participated in one or more of IBSA's training offerings through August.

The Midwest Leadership Summit, planned by 9 cooperating Midwest Baptist state conventions every three years, was hosted by IBSA in Springfield in 2020, as it was in 2015 and 2018. The MLS will again by hosted by IBSA in Springfield in 2022, with the increased frequency being due to the event's popularity and effectiveness.

In 2020 IBSA began an intentional Revitalization ministry, under the leadership of Scott Foshie. Our goals in this area involve enlisting both pastors and churches in separate self-assessment processes, and then beginning relationships through trained coaches that may lead to a more intensive revitalization process with certified pathfinders. Enthusiasm was strong among pastors in early 2020, but many found it necessary to postpone their plans for revitalization processes in order to manage challenges such as virtual worship services, online giving, and the requirements of socially distant ministry. We believe there will be a strong renewal of interest in revitalization by pastors, churches, and associations in 2021. But through August, 34 churches have completed a revitalization self-assessment and 11 churches and 3 associations are participating in an in-depth revitalization process.

Year-end measurements of missions giving from churches will not be available until Annual Church Profiles are compiled in early 2021. Through September, however, Cooperative Program giving is down about 10% (it was up 3.1% through the same period last year), again due largely to the impact of the pandemic on churches. Mission Illinois Offering receipts through August are down compared to the previous year by 12.8%. And previously annual financial support from LifeWay Christian Resources was eliminated in early 2020, reducing IBSA's budget in both 2020 and 2021 by almost \$60,000. Nevertheless, because overall expenses are down proportionately, total income over expenses through September 2020 are actually stronger than last year. The proposed 2021 IBSA Budget plans for a return in CP giving to \$6.2 million by year-end, with a contingency plan to draw on reserves if necessary.

While face-to-face contact has been a challenge in 2020, IBSA staff have made a concerted effort to connect with and engage pastors and churches in 2020, through phone, e-mail, webinars, town halls, and videoconferencing. As a result, the IBSA staff reached and exceeded its annual goal of having individual connection or consultation with 85% of churches by the end of June. I'm very pleased with the way our staff has stepped up its use of technology and alternate communication methods to actually increase at least virtual service to churches.

The IBSA missionaries, staff, and I appreciate so much the partnership and cooperation of IBSA churches and consider it a joy to serve the Lord through this ministry. We welcome any questions or input that may assist us in serving IBSA churches more effectively.

IBSA Board of Directors Recommendations

The IBSA Board of Directors recommends that the proposed 2021 budget, salary structure, and CP ratio be approved as printed, based on a Cooperative Program Goal of \$6,200,000 and a Cooperative Program ratio of 56.5%/43.5% (IBSA/SBC), excluding shared expenses not to exceed 10% of the Cooperative Program Goal, and with Cooperative Program funds received beyond the budget goal to be distributed at a ratio of 50%/50%. In addition, due to the uncertain circumstances surrounding the Coronavirus pandemic and its potentially ongoing effects on Cooperative Program giving, the IBSA Board of Directors recommends approval to access up to an additional \$400,000 in reserves as necessary to support the 2021 IBSA Budget.

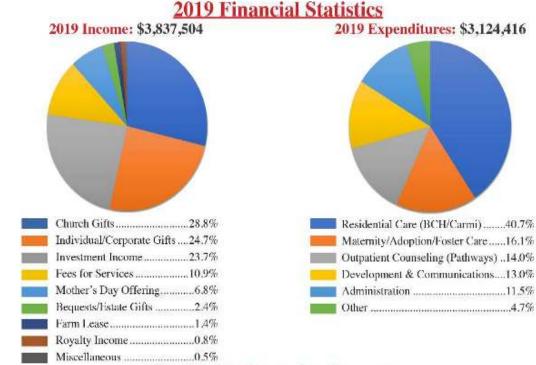

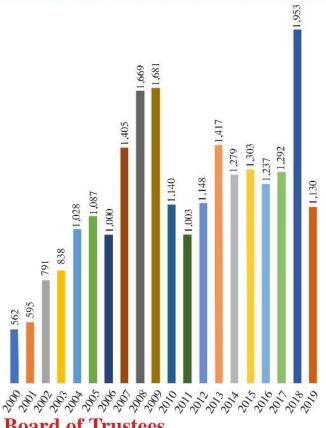

Executive Director's Report Doug Morrow



Wow 2020! I suppose every report to our associations will begin with the exclamation that this has been an incredible year. A pandemic has popped, markets have melted, and our culture here in the U.S. has seemingly gone crazy!

But our report is good news in the midst of such chaos. BFI has actually grown and continues to increase our effectiveness in our core mission - encouraging the stewardship and generosity of Illinois Baptists.

BFI accomplishes this through five divisions. In the following pages, we'll provide a brief overview of our progress in each.

1. Life Stewardship

In the US we often accumulate things — retirement accounts, real estate, and life insurance, just to name a few. Because of this, the single largest opportunity to have an impact on our needs AND Kingdom causes is often at the end of our physical lives. BFI offers confidential, customized Christian Estate Planning services at no charge. When we really believe that God owns what we manage and that God has expectations for us, it really does change our entire approach! To date, BFI has served more than 300 families, helping Illinois Baptists care for their families AND advance the Kingdom.

BFI renewed its partnership with IBSA and BCHFS to offer Freewill. com, a zero cost (to Illinois Baptist users) platform that makes creating a legally valid simple will and incapacity documents (health Snapshot Year founded: 1985

and finance power of attorney) straightforward, confidential, and flexible. Here, Illinois Baptists can make a plan that provides protection and support for their families and they can elect to support Kingdom causes of their choosing.

Additionally, BFI provides individual financial coaching to help them maximize the effectiveness of their stewardship efforts. And generosity is emphasized by using BFI's Donor Advised Fund; each year realizes dollars for various ministries.

2. BFI Church Loans

We continue to increase our loan portfolio, both in numbers and total dollars. These loans have a simple application process and represent permanent financing (no balloon payments). And of course, growing church buildings supports growing churches! The great majority of our \$10M+ in loans are currently being pre-paid, many aggressively, saving our churches even more in interest.

Perhaps most important of all, the interest from these loans supports Illinois Baptist investors, keeping these funds in the Kingdom and amplifying the effect of these resources.

3. Educational Scholarships

Each year BFI awards almost \$80,000 in scholarships to Illinois Baptist Students. These scholarships range from awards for Associate Degrees (\$1,000) to Bachelor (\$2,000) to Seminary (\$2,675). These scholarships are the product of generous Illinois Baptists who believe that God is very interested in the "transforming of our minds" as we serve and prepare for future service. This year be-

cause of the generosity of the Miner family, we have added the Melvin L. Miner Memorial Scholarship fund. Mr. Miner was a faithful member of the First Baptist Church of Rochester.

Applications are received online each year at BaptistFoundationIL.org for 30 days beginning Jan. 1.

4. Saving/Investing

BFI provides investing and saving accounts for both churches and individuals with a wide variety of options, all of which considerably outperform bank savings. If we're managing God's money, then wise stewardship really does matter — and prudent investing honors God.

To receive a multi-year performance report on all of BFI investment options, visit BaptistFoundationIL. org. BFI also provides customized counsel to financial teams, helping them allocate resources, plan prudently and even communicate with their congregations in a way that maximizes the stewardship and generosity of God's people.

5. Church Legacy Program

To date, BFI has helped 28 Illinois Baptist congregations ready to close by helping them have future ministry impact and, in many cases, seeing a new church replanted at their location. We create a "legacy fund" that provides ongoing support for missions and ministry in the church's name, ensuring that the good work God has done will not be forgotten, will be honored and continues to help expand His Kingdom.

From Harrison (north of Murphysboro) to Chicago, churches that entered the Legacy Program have also seen new congregations planted at their locations. These new congregations are baptizing new Christians and are helping to ensure an enduring Gospel witness in these church building locations.

It truly is our honor to serve. On behalf of the 21 Illinois Baptist men and women who comprise our Board of Trustees, let me again say thank you for allowing us to lead in a conversation about stewardship, and how we can most honor our King by serving Him with all we manage.
