 - **Instead of:** "What did you think of the sermon?"
 - **Try:** "How did the sermon challenge your perspective on [topic]?"
- **Spark (Respectful) Debate:** Don't shy away from challenging questions or playing devil's advocate. Encourage your group to wrestle with different perspectives and grapple with tough questions.
 - **Instead of:** "Do you agree with the author?"
 - **Try:** "What are some potential counterarguments to the author's point?"
- **Connect to Real Life:** Make sure the discussion doesn't stay theoretical. Guide your group to apply the lessons to their own lives.
 - **Instead of:** "What does this passage teach us about forgiveness?"
 - **Try:** "How can we apply the concept of forgiveness in our relationships this week?"

Building a Safe Haven: Trust is Key

A thriving small group is built on trust. Create a safe space where people feel comfortable being vulnerable and sharing their true selves without fear of judgment or gossip.

- **Set Boundaries:** Establish and review group guidelines that emphasize confidentiality and respect. Let everyone know that what's shared in the group stays in the group. Provide a written group covenant.
- **Affirm and Validate:** Even when you disagree with someone's perspective, acknowledge their courage to share. If necessary, have a private conversation later, but always maintain a loving and supportive tone.
- **Gently Redirect:** If someone offers unsolicited advice or disrespects another member, gently remind them of the group's commitment to safety and listening without judgment.



Navigating Challenging Personalities

- **The Over-Talker:**
 - **During the meeting:** Gently remind everyone of the group's commitment to equal participation.

- **The Non-Talker:**
 - **During the meeting:** Make them feel comfortable sharing by occasionally calling on them and affirming their contributions.
 - **One-on-one:** Encourage them to open up more, emphasizing the value of their perspective.
- **The Tangent-Starter:**
 - **During the meeting:** Allow for occasional detours, but firmly steer the conversation back on track when necessary.
 - **One-on-one:** Help them understand the importance of staying focused while still valuing their insights.
- **The Insensitive One:**
 - **During the meeting:** Reinforce group guidelines and address any hurtful behavior directly.
 - **One-on-one:** Emphasize the importance of creating a safe and respectful environment for everyone.
