

- Have already experienced higher poverty rates than Gen Z, millennials, Gen X and baby boomers
- Surrounded by college-educated adults
- Longest lifespan to date
- Will retire much later or not at all



They are TRUE Digital Natives.

- Born the same year the iPad launched
- Started school online
- Visit the doctor online
- Default answer = ask the internet
- 65% will have technology-based jobs that don't yet exist.



They Struggle to Connect.

- Short attention span
- Lose interest in anything that isn't gamified
- Struggle to connect



Family of Origin

- They expect to stay in their childhood home longer.
- During COVID lockdowns, many combined residences.
- Current housing crisis has continued this reshuffling.



Family of Origin

- Their parents are intentionally parenting differently.
- Their parents feel isolated and alone.
- There is a rise in domestic violence and child abuse.



They are "Spiritual."

- Because of their upbringing, they are spiritual, but church is optional.
- They seek authenticity, transparency and diversity.
- Answers to spiritual questions are found online.



They are anxious.



From 2016 to 2020, the number of children ages 3 – 17 years diagnosed with anxiety grew by 29%. This resulted in 5.6 million children with diagnosed anxiety in 2020, a number that is continuing to climb.

Common challenges kids with anxiety disorders experience at church include:

- Separating from parents
- Taking part in church events and activities that depart from the weekly routine
- Expectations for self-disclosure in small groups
- Group activities in which they're at risk of becoming a center of attention
- Large group social situations
- Transitions between age-group ministries
